FIFTEEN PERFECT SCORES LEADING THE WAY

No less than 15 players lead the way going into round 3, each scoring a perfect 2/2 in Friday's play.

GMs Tregubov, Akobian, Kacheishvili, Lenderman, Finegold, Panchanathan, Kekelidze, Browne and Amanov are joined by IMs Foisor and Formanek, FMs Hansen, Bryant and Naroditsky and the only untitled player in the bunch, Gregory Young.

Young and Formanek scored what have been so far rare upsets in the National Open by beating GMs de Firmian and Kogan respectively.

Of the best games I could find from the first 2 rounds, the following encounter on board 4 in round 2 between one of the most talented juniors in the country, GM Alex Lenderman, and up and coming junior, Jeffery Haskel, caught my attention.



Lenderman plays for tactics, but possibly in the wrong way. 15...Nexg4!? 16.fxg4 Nxe4 17.Bd3 f5 is equal according to my silicon friend.

16...Nxe4!? immediately was an interesting alternative leading to complicated play.



White is now clearly winning this position.



It was still not too late to switch back to the previous plan with 29.Rg1

32...Re6! 33.Be3?!

White's position was already losing despite this error. A better try was something like 33.b5 axb5 34.axb5 Re2+ 35.Kf1 g3 36.Nh4 g2+ 37.Nxg2 Rxg2 38.b6 Rc2 but Black should still be winning here.

33...Bxd6 34.c5 Bh2!

Lenderman shows no mercy now the end is in sight.

35.b5 axb5 36.axb5 Re5 37.Nh4 Rxh5 38.b6 Rxh4 39.c6 Bd6 40.c7 Rh2+ 0-1


TACTICS TRAINING FROM THE GRANDMASTERS (AND JOSH)
